STORMWATER COMPLIANCE AT **RETAIL GASOLINE OUTLETS**

Purpose

The purpose of this Compliance Assistance Bulletin is to help owners and operators of Retail Gasoline Outlets (RGOs) comply with Stormwater Program requirements, prepare for inspections, answer frequently asked questions, and provide additional resources.

Issue As mandated by State requirements, the County of Sacramento Environmental Management Department (EMD) is implementing a stormwater compliance program on behalf of the County, and the cities of Citrus Heights, Elk Grove, Galt, Folsom, Rancho Cordova and Sacramento, as of July 1, 2004. This program includes triennial stormwater compliance inspections at facilities such as retail gas stations.

Gasoline, antifreeze, motor oil, grease, food waste, and other pollutants such as wastewater from surface washing activities, are often discharged, or otherwise washed into the **storm drainage system** from retail gasoline outlets (RGOs) and other businesses. When these pollutants enter the storm drainage system they flow <u>untreated</u> into our local waterways where they degrade water quality and harm aquatic life. Certain pollutants can also block or damage underground pipes and attract vermin. Facility operators must prevent prohibited discharges to the storm drainage system and implement measures to reduce pollutant sources associated with their activities.

ComplianceEMD is conducting Stormwater Compliance Inspections, in conjunction with Underground
Storage Tank (UST) inspections, once every three years. The following are typical areas of
concern:

Typical Areas of Concern of Concern - Spills and leaks from fuel dispensing, auto repair, air/water service and UST fill areas must always be promptly cleaned up – preferably using dry-cleanup methods – and never washed, or allowed to run into the storm drainage system.

- <u>Spill clean-up materials</u> should always be available onsite and employees should be trained to use them. Appropriate materials include: absorbent sweep, haz-mat and oil absorbent pillows and socks, and spill containment berms, or similar items to block and contain spills.
- <u>Exterior storage containers</u> including dumpsters and tallow bins must be leak-free, closed when not in use, in good working condition, and with no accumulation of trash, food, grease or other pollutants on the ground, or near storm drains.
- <u>Surface cleaning and pressure washing</u> wash water must be contained, collected and discharged to the sanitary sewer, private sewage system or serviceable sump or, if hazardous, lawfully disposed of as hazardous waste. | Typical Areas of Concern (continued) | <u>Vehicle washing/detailing and auto repair/operations</u> must also be performed in a manner that prevents the discharge of pollutants to the storm drainage system. Call (916) 875-8440 or go to <u>EMD.SACCOUNTY.NET</u> for more information. <u>Dumpsters and waste containers</u> should be sound and leak free. Dumpster lids should always be closed when not in use and dumpsters should never be overfilled. <u>Fueling Areas</u>: Fuel spills and leaks must be promptly cleaned and never washed or allowed to run into the storm drainage system. | | | | |
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| If Food is Prepared at Your Facility | <u>Outdoor Interceptors</u>: Outdoor interceptors must be maintained to prevent overflow of grease to the storm drainage system and kept in good working condition. <u>Roof Top Equipment</u>: Roof-top equipment must be maintained to prevent grease and other non-stormwater discharges from reaching the storm drain system via downspouts. <u>Indoor Drains</u>: Indoor drains and sinks must be connected to the sanitary sewer or approved private sewage disposal system. | | | | |
| Corrective Action | Stormwater violations will result in a Notice of Violation that requires the violations to be corrected and proof of compliance to be submitted within a given time frame. Extensions may be granted on a case by case basis. If additional enforcement action is necessary due to failure to comply, it will be progressive and depend on the severity and duration of the violation. Fines of up to a maximum of \$5000 per violation are authorized by local ordinance. | | | | |
| Questions and Answers | Are storm drains and sanitary sewer drains different? Yes – The storm drainage system directs untreated stormwater into our creeks and rivers. The sanitary sewer system directs water to a plant where it is treated prior to discharge. Drains located in streets and parking lots are storm drains. Outdoor drains rarely lead to the sanitary sewer. Why should I be concerned about stormwater and storm drains? Water pollution is everyone's business and should be a major concern for all residents. Polluted stormwater is a major source of contamination in our creeks and rivers. | | | | |
